



Creative Writing Coronavirus

If you have seen the news in recent days, you most likely have heard of a new strain of sickness called Coronavirus currently running rampant in several countries around the world, including the United States. The sickness is called COVID-19 by the World Health Organization and is a cousin to the SARS virus. This strain of Coronavirus got its start in Wuhan, China and was thought to have originated from bats, which are hosts of a wide range of zoonotic viruses.


On December 31st, 2019, cases of pneumonia were first reported in Wuhan, China. This lead to Chinese health authorities closing the Huanan Seafood Wholesale Market after finding out that the animals sold there could have been the source of the virus. By January 7th, the virus was identified as the Coronavirus, and the first death from the virus occurred just 4 days later. As the days went on, more and more cases of the virus were reported, with more deaths occurring. On January 21st of 2020, the first case of Coronavirus in the United States was declared. The World Health Organization declared "a public health emergency of international concern" on January 30th. On February 14th, a Chinese tourist in France died of the virus, marking the first death in Europe due to the outbreak. February 29th marked the first death from Coronavirus in the United States. As of February, more than 70,000 cases have been reported and over 2,000 deaths have occurred, mainly in China. Many other countries now have confirmed cases as well. Now that we are nearing the end of March, in Colorado, a stay at home order has been issued for the whole state. This has caused the cancellation of any event that would host over 10 people, and has also caused students across the state and the country to do school from home, as we are all doing now.

The symptoms of Coronavirus are fever, cough, shortness of breath, and breathing difficulties. These could occur anywhere between 2–14 days after exposure. If the case is more severe, you may experience pneumonia, severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), kidney failure, or even death. Most people who contract the virus will be able to recover on their own, but the weaker your immune system is, the more at risk of the infection you are. A good way to protect yourself against the virus is to practice good cold and flu hygiene as well as by practicing social distancing techniques, such as washing your hands often, covering your mouth when you cough or sneeze, avoiding close contact with others, and staying home as much as you can to prevent the spread.



Amazing Facts About the Human Body


- -The human body is a strange and fascinating place and so much of it still remains a mystery to us. For example, did you know that tongue prints are as unique as fingerprints, or that humans have 46 chromosomes while crayfish boast 200?
- -Adult humans spend about 33% of their lives asleep. A python spends about 75% of their life asleep, and a dog spends about 44% of their lives asleep.
- -The highest blood flow isn't in your heart, liver, or brain it's in your kidneys. That's because kidneys are the body's natural filtration system.
- -The average person has about 5 pounds of bacteria in his or her digestive system.
- Your body has more than 600 muscles. Your strongest muscle is located in your jaw known as the masseter muscle. The stapedius muscle, located in the middle of your ear, is your weakest muscle.
- -For an adult human, taking just one step uses up to 200 muscles.
- -Your brain has a harder time with long-term memories. In time, your brain will have a harder time with long-term memory because the brain is unable to filter and remove old memories which prevent it from absorbing new ideas. That means the brain has to work harder to produce memories over the average lifetime.
- -In an adult human, 25% of their bones are in the feet.
- -Your heart beats about 100,000 times a day. Depending on your beats per minute, your heart beats about 100,000 times a day. That means it sends 2,000 gallons of blood through the body.
